Interview with A. J. Shirley

Maysville, Oklahoma

Born:

July 3, 1861, Arkansas

Parents:

Arion Shirley, Alabama Anna Cleveland, Alabama

I was born in 1861, in Arkansas. I came to Indian Territory in 1886 and settled at a place called Postoak in the Chickasaw Nation.

I leased fifty acres of land and hauled the lumber from Denison, Texas, and built me a house and began farming. There was a gin and gist mill at Postoak, but there was no market for cotton at Postoak. I had to haul my cotton to Denison, Texas. That was also where I had to get what few things I had to buy. I did not have to buy many things. I raised everything we ate except meat.

There was plenty of deer, turkey, squirrel and rabbits and the woods were full of quail, but in that time a quail was too small a thing to waste a shell on.

In 1887 Postoak was changed to the name of Emmitt. I hauled the first load of lumber from Denison, Texas to build a store at Emmitt. Later, I do not remember what year, Emmitt was again changed to Milburn.

When I settled at Postoak the Chickasaw Indians held their court at Tishomingo, the capital of the Chickasaw Nation.

There were no railroads in that part of the country then, there were stage lines. There was a stage line from Caddo to Tishomingo and on north and west to Fort Sill. There was also one from Caddo to Denison, Texas.

I believe the Sante Fe Railroad built north from Texas through the Chickasaw Nation in 1886. It was built north from Red River to Ardmore and on into where Oklahoma City is now.

The stage line was stopped from Caddo to Fort Sill in 1887. I farmed at Emmitt until 1894. At that time I moved to old Ada in the northeast part of the Chickasaw Nation and leased a farm there.

At that time Jeff Reed had a general merchandise store and was the postmaster; the post office was in this store. He told me he established the post office in 1890 and Ada was named for his daughter, Ada Reed.

I have never gone to any of the Indian Stomp dances, but I have been to their ball games.

In that day and time our main fun came once each year on the Fourth of July. At that time there would be a big picnic given, sometimes it would start a day or two before the Fourth and last three or four days after. The Indians would have a ball game each day and the white people would have a dance platform, and there would be dancing all day and night. There would be merry-go-round, pulled by a mule. It cost ten cents to ride the merry-goround, and by the time they got it stopped, it would be loaded down again. It took two men to stop it and the mule had to be well-trained, for if he happened to stumble and fall, it would be too bad. I saw one mule killed. The music on this swing was furnished by a man who played the fiddle. He would play for his rides and when he got tired there was always someone else to take his place.

The Indians in their ball games would only wear breech-cloths and go without hats, right in the hot sun. There would be a bunch of Indians from one county playing another bunch from another county. At that time the Chickasaw Nation was divided into four counties. They used to throw the ball with a stick and were not allowed to touch the ball with their hands. There would be a pole in the center of the ground and when one would throw the ball with the stick and hit the pole, that counted one point for his side. I have seen them hit each other over the head with these sticks and someone would have to carry the injured person out.

When new Ada started to build, I helped build the first building. New Ada was started in the middle of a large cotton field in 1900. There was a gin there and

the man who had bought this gin had failed to pay for it, and the company that owned it had it closed down. That left the farmers in a bad condition with plenty of cotton to be ginned and the gin closed down. Jeff Reed came to me and wanted me to buy the gin, said the farmers owed him for groceries and he could not get his money until their cotton was ginned. I told him I did not have enough money to buy a horse, let alone a gin. He said I did not need any money. He went on my note and I started in the gin business with about fifty dollars in money, but at the end of that fall, after the cotton was all ginned, I had paid for the gin and also bought a saw mill and sawed all the heavy timber that was used in building New Ada.

I ran the gin and sawmill a few years, sold out and went into the grocery business at New Ada. I stayed in the grocery business until 1909; at that time I sold out and moved to Mayville and bought a gin there. I have lived at Maysville, Oklahoma since 1909.

Jacob apparently died before 1850 Census, as Lucinda is listed as head of household in Shannon Co., Mo.

In 1840 there is a Jacob Sherley who was married to Sophia, and they had three children. Their home was in a part of Crawford Co., Mo. which is now Dent Co. In the 1850 Census, Jacob and Sophia's children are in the family of Thomas Shirley, believed to be a brother of Jacob. (Can anyone shed any light on this? Was Jacob married twice?)

When Jacob purchased land from the government in Crawford Co., Mo in 1838, he said he was from Warren Co., Tenn. In the 1850 Census, Thomas said he was born in N.C. (Also in 1850 Census appears Geo. Shirley.)

William Sparks, a wealthy agriculturist and stock raiser of Dent Co., Mo. has resided on his present farm of 440 acres since his marriage in 1875. He is considered as one of the successful farmers of the county. He was born in Wilkes Co., N.C. in 1846 and when 29 yrs of age, married Miss Sarah J. Shirley, who was born in Dent Co., Mo. Jan. 15, 1849, a daughter of Jacob & Lucinda Shirley, both of whom died when Sarah was quite young. She is the mother of 6 children and a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Mr. Sparks has always been a democrat in politics, and is a son of Reuben and Blineld (Gray) Sparks, who was born in Wilkes Co., N.C. about 1812 & 1829, respectively. The father was of German descent and a farmer by occupation.

NEW HAMPSHIRE SHIRLEYS FROM IRELAND

Some of the New Hampshire Shirleys in the July 1979 issue, p. 10, came to Warren Co., Pa.

Item from Warren Ledger, Sept. 20, 1878

Steamboat Accident..Boiler Exploded..One Man Killed Instantly...Two Others Badly... Scalded..Steamer Sunk.

On Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 17, 1878, at about 4:00 P.M., while the steamer "Shirley Bell" was on her upward passage from Irvington and about one and one-half miles below this town, her boiler exploded, instantly killing her Captain Hiram C. Shirley of Glade, and severely injuring the engineer, Mr. Thomas Bell of Warren, Pa., and the fireman, Moses Shirley, of Glade. Captain Shirley was at the wheel which was immediately over the boiler, and was without doubt instantly killed. His body was found in the river a few rods below the boat in a horribly mutilated condition, the whole front part of the head being carried away, and one of his legs broken. The Fireman was standing in the forward part of the boat and was blown into the river. He is badly scalded about the face and neck, and though not dangerously injured, he suffers great pain. Mr. Bell, the engineer, was in the cabin. He is scalded on the back and legs, but not dangerously injured. Captain A. Din-ley of Brooklyn, N.Y. was the only passenger on the boat and his escape was truly remarkable, as the boiler came up thru the upper deck where he was sitting, and passed over his head--dropping into the river about 100 yards behind the boat.

Justice D. C. James, acting Coroner, held an inquest and the jury composed of the following named gentlemen: W. A. Mitchel, A. Rearick, Jam. Bennett, John A. Gray, Thomas McNett, and D. Carroll.

After viewing the body of Capt. Shirley rendered a verdict of accidental death. The boat sunk immediately after the explosion, and what remains of it now lies in about five feet of water near the residence of N. Sill Esq. Mr. Shirley was about 45 years of age and leaves a wife and eight children to mourn his sudden death. Mr. Bell said there was eighty pounds of steam on at the time of the

explosion and plenty of water in the boiler. The boiler was an old one, purchased in Tidioute, and was undoubtly defective. Mr. Bell's injuries are severe; his head, neck, arms, shoulders, back and ankles scalded. He suffers great pain but is not in a dangerous condition. His coat and hat were blown away. The town was thrown in great excitement. The owners of the boat undoubtedly believed the boiler was safe, but for some cause the public did not think so and hence but one passenger on board.



ETTINGDON

In the mid-county of Warwick, England is the manor and Parish of Ettingdon, the original seat of the ancient family of Shirley. Ettingdon lies about midway between the Vale of Red Horse and the rich plains of Evesham. The church and manor house are built, as is the case with most old places, at the very extremity of the parish, on the north-eastern bank of the river Stour, which is both the division between the counties of Warwick & Worcester, and the parishes of Ettingdon and Treddington.

That Ettingdon may lay claim to have been a place of some note, even before the Norman Conquest, is proved by the Roman remains which are continually found there, such as coins of the Lower Empire, brass ornaments, and great quantities of broken pottery, and from these circumstances it might have been the site of a Roman Villa.



Ordered that Sarah Shirley be admitted to administer on the estate of James Shirley, deceased; she complying with the law, Apr. 27, 1778 - Court held for County of Yohogania Co, Va. now Augusta Co.

June 24, 1778 Yohogania Co. p. 243. ordered sum of 40S. per month be allowed to the widow of James Shirley killed in the service - then a soldier in the 13th Va. Regt. in service of the U.S. for support and maintenance of herself and child, the same to commence from last March 25, 1778.

Sargant James Shirley was in Capt. Benj. Harrison's Company stationed at Ft. Pitt. He was in the 13th Va. Reg. Mar/1778


