

SHIRLEY HOUSE, VICKSBURG NATIONAL MILITARY PARK

This house belonged to James Shirley, born in 1794, New Hampshire. He was graduated at Dartmouth College, read law at Albany, New York and soon left for Augusta, Ga. where he was in charge of an academy. He began his practice in Florence, Alabama and persued it in Huntsville, Ala., but finally settled in Vicksburg, Mississippi. His character was unblemished, his loyalty to the Union uncompromising. It was his plantation that the interview occurred between General Grant and General Pomberton, which lead to the surrender of Vicksburg, Jult 4, 1863. The entrenchments ran through his front yard and his house was destroyed. General Grant gave him possession of the house of a Confederate. After the surrender of Vicksburg a great many claimed to have been loyal and General Grant referred their cases to Mr. Shirley, General Grant was the commander of more than 50,000 men in the Yankee Army whose sole object at the time was to wrest control of the Mississippi from the boys in grey

The key to strategy of both was Vicksburg. As long as that city of 5,000 (then) stayed in the hands of the Confederates, the CSA had a slim chance. Food and other supplies, plus military replacements could flow into the Confederacy from its Western third.

If Vicksburg changed hands all would be lost. The Yankees could use the fortress city to control the river and choke off supplies. On July 4, 1863, the day after Pickett's charge at Gettysburg failed, Vicksburg fell.

It was a bloody six weeks from May to July. Union casualties totalled 10,000, consisting of 1,500 dead, 7,500 wounded and 1,000 missing. Grey losses were 9,000

of which 1400 died, 3800 wounded, and 3800 missing.

A large piece of the battlefield has been preserved as the Vicksburg National Military Park. The Park Service maintains 1800 acres there...cutting over 700 acres of grass in the summer. There are monuments and artillery pieces for visitors to see. The SHIRLEY HOUSE is still standing (restored). It is the only structure remaining in the park.

James descends from James Shirley born in 1629 in Ireland, probably in the north in Ulster Co. He came to America in 1730 (Chester, New Hampshire), James was 76 when he came to America and he brought with him a full grown family. He died at the age of 105 years. [the following is taken from a letter from Julia Creamer, niece of Henry Garnett Shirley]....

Walter Shirley came to the Colony of New Jersey in 1726 and married Dorcas Avis. They came to Frederick Co. Va. prior to 1745. He obtained a 400 acre grant here and the deed to this land is in my hands. It was signed by Lord Fairfax and one is signed by George Washington who surveyed it and all the land around here.

Walter was one of 17 children born to the Earl of Ferrers and Lady Elizabeth Washington Shirley in 1690. According to the Register of the Chapel of Staunton Harold it reads, "Walter Shirley, 8th son was born April 27, baptized June ye 3rd A.D.-1690. [In"Stemmata Shirleianna" written in 1876 by Evelyn Philip Shirley, he says Walter died as infant... Helen Post, Shirley Association member and descendant of Walter, wrote to Staunton Harold England requesting a search of the Registers. The response was... "We have been through the registers for the appropriate period and while Walter's birth is there, there is no entry up to 1726. This is of course a negative argument, what it shows is that he was neither married or buried at Staunton Harold, and he could had died elsewhere."]

William Shirley, Governor of Massachusetts (in 1741-1756), gave George Washington his command as Commader-in-chief of the Continental Armies. He was either a cousin or brother of Walter because our family had a painting (of which I have a copy) of Governor William Shirley giving young George Washington his command.

William Shirley was successful in England whereas Walter got into some sort of trouble and decided to get out of the country.

My father's grandfather, James (b. 1768), did have several brothers which he lost track of. His brother John Shirley, moved to Decatur, BROWN CO. OHIO. and we lost

all word of him. Another brother, Timothy Shirley, left here after serving in the Rev. War, and moved to Maysville, MASON CO KENTUCKY. [From editor: Could this be in reverse? Records show JOHN SHIRLEY IN MASON CO, KY and Timothy Shirley in Brown Co. Ohio... if this is correct, is this the John Shirley in Jan. '82 NEWS p.10 ???].

My uncle Henry Shirley made two trips to England and looked up Shirleys over there both times and went to the Shirley Castle. Actually there are two family estates and Henry's grand-daughter had been in both. Henry found out that Shirleys over there couldn't care less what had become of the Shirleys over here and in no way wanted to claim any kin and rather resistant to questions. At one estate where an old man named Shirley lived alone, except for a few servants, he at first wouldn't let my uncle in; then he only saw him for a short time and made it plain that he didn't intend to have much to do with any American Shirleys.

Now Lady Elizabeth Shirley at Staunton Hall was more gracious. She got to see the Castle; but, she also made it very plain that she was in no way interested. Her father, the Earl of Ferrer, was not home at the time and he was a widower. Everyone told my uncle Henry he was so well liked and quite friendly to American Shirleys but would not discuss lines at all. That was prior to WWII of course. Besides the castle there had hundreds of acres of land around it and they were considered well off.

After the war most big landowners of England went broke due to high taxes and the war. American Shirleys over here were contacted and asked if they would be interested in saving or owning a part of Staunton Harold Hall as the Earl of Ferrers was bankrupt and Staunton Hall would have to be sold.

The day of the sale the Earl of Ferrers died of a heart attact during the auction.

As I understand it, the castle was sold plus a small amount of land separately and the son(present Earl of Ferrers) and Lady Elizabeth had just a small piece of the land. Lord Culpeper inherited his father's share of THE VIRGINIA COMPANY and left England in the autum of 1623. Was exiled, and on September 18, 1649 he and his cousin-german, Thomas Culpeper (son of John 12 of Feckenhon)

(?) part of the proprietary of Northern Neck of Virginia. He died in England in 1660.

Lord Culpeper was first married to Philippa Snelling of West Grinstead Co. Sussex. She was the daughter of Sir George Snelling and CAECILIA SHERLEY, (daughter of Thomas Sherley and Philippa Caryll). [Do not confuse this Caecilia with the one who married Lord Delaware West].

Philippa Culpeper was buried at Hollengbourne September 16, 1630 as Phillip, wife of Sir John Culpeper, Knight, and there is a lengthy inscription in Latin.

Thomas Culpeper (John ¹³, 1st Lord Culpeper) 1635-1687, of Leeds Castle, 2nd Lord Culpeper, was a large figure in the Colonial History of Virginia.

Michael (b. 1717), then known as Capt. McGuire because of his service in American Revolution, sold his properties in Frederick Co. Md. and went west and north into Bedford Co. Pa. in 1788, later settling in the now Cambria Co. Pa.

John McGuire, an Indian trader and guide for George Washington in November, 1735 (may have been uncle of Michael Jr. or son of Macheal Jr.) He disappeared from the records in Frederick Co. Md. in 1767; reappeared in Bedford Co. Pa tax list in 1774. Later in 1786, he appeared on same tax list in Frankstown Bedford Co. Pa (John Shirley on same tax list 1786). John had land known as Sinking Valley in Pa and it was to him that the Michael McGuire father and sons went to prepare for their families to come North into Pa. John McGuire listed in E. Caln twp 1779 Chester Co. Pa. also a Thomas. [Note: see April'79 issue of the NEWS page 10 for will of Thomas Shirley in 1769...E. Caln, Chester Co. Pa.].

Note from your editor ...

In the will of Thomas Shirly of Caln Twp Chester Co. Pa of 1769...his dau. was married to a Lafferty. Children of Alice Shirley Gilson, (dau. of John and Charity Shirley of Bedford Co. Pa.) married into both the Lafferty and McGuire families and some of these families went to Crawford Co. PA.

The name assocations continue on with the Rhodes family which was prominent in Blair Co. (part of Bedford Co. Pa). There is a connection with the McGraw family and the Shirleys. Sarah Shirley, Daughter of John and Charity Shirley m. a McGraw. (also a connection with the McCraws and the Rhodes). William Shirley who left Bedford Co. Pa and went to Scott Co. Ky., left a will there and it was witnessed by a John and Walter Rodes. Another name assoc. is that of Capt. Thomas Norris who was in the Frederick Co. Md. Militia with Capt. Michael McGuire. George Shirley b. 1761 of Bedford Co. Pa. m. Ruhannah Norris. She was the dau. of Joseph and Mary (Moody) Norris of Hagerstown, Washington Co. Md. Another name associated with the Bedford Co. Pa. Shirleys is the name Keith and the Moore family. As written about in the Jan '82 issue of the NEWS page 15, these families also went to Ky. as did William of Bedford Co. Pa. on page 14 of the same issue of the NEWS.

The McGuire family married into the Michael Shirley family. His daughters Mary b. 1762 m. William McGuire and Elizabeth m. Thomas McGuire. Michael Shirley was b. ca. 1740. He too was in the war. He returned to Pa. after he finished his stint in the service. From there he went to Augusta Co. Va. and then onto Kentucky where he was killed by Indians in 1784 while surveying in old Lincoln Co. Ky. (now known as Madison Co.).

Also found in Madison Co. Ky. is Christian Shirley and his father, Peter, who was in Washington Co. Md. in 1785.

Michael Shirley's daughter Mary and husband, William McGuire sold land to Christian Shirley, in Madison Co.

Ky., Grundy Co. Mo., and died in Tipton Co. Indiana. (Could this William be a son of Richard Shirley who died 1796 in Scott Co. Ky.???).

SHURLEY GRAVEYARD

The colonial home of Henry Shurley stands across the road from the golf course at Tarboro Country Club. The cemetery, once beautifully kept is now overgrown and the handsome carved Italian marble gravesones disrupted by fallen trees, several of them lying face down. Some of the stones have been removed to other cemeteries.

The Shurley farm, giving way to progress became the site of Hart Cotton Mills and the mill village.

Henry Shurley was born May 1779 d. Oct 13, 1854. He was the son of Richard...see OCT. 1982, page 12 of the Shirley NEWS. (Info sent by Florence Hodges and taken from...TOMBSTONES & CENSUS RECORDS OF EARLY EDGECOMB CO. N.C. by William & Griffin).

"Cletus Shirley, my cousin, was born in a one-room house near Holdenville, Okla." Hershel B. King said. "When she was 16 and in high school her dad got a job roughnecking in the oil field at Seminole. They added a room, but times still were not too good for the Shirleys.

"One Saturday, Cletus saw this rich Indian squaw in town with a pair of white gloves. She decided then and there she was going to have a pair exactly like them.

"Cletus got the Sears catalog and looked for white gloves. She found a pair just like the squaw's. They were \$1.98. She'd get the catalog out every night and, by lamplight, look and dream.

"One day she asked the cotton farmer who had a 25 acre field next-house to them if she could pick the stripping. The field had been picked twice but, in late winter, a few bolls would appear. No one could ever pick a field completely bare.

"She'd found out that she could get two cents a pound for that type of cotton. A hundred pounds would get her the gloves and a stamp to mail the order off to Dallas. This was in 1930.

"Every Saturday for a month she picked cotton all day long, even in freezing weather. Have you ever picked cotton when it is freezing? It's like sticking your hand in a running rose bush.

"The day came when she had her 100 pounds of cotton. She got the gloves. She cared for them like a mother with her first child. She was the happiest girl in Oklahoma.

"Every other Sunday, the clan gathered at Grandma Carrie Mc Coin's. She'd pile acres and acres of fried chicken, brown gravy, homemade light-bread rolls, peach cobbler, cakes and pies on a long table on her screened porch. Before sundown, one of the uncles would drive into Holdenville in the Model T, buy 100 pounds of ice, wrap it up in some Capper's Weeklies and a few cotton sacks and we'd have three freezers of homemade ice cream.

"One of my uncles cut hair all day long for 10 cents a head. While they were waiting their turns, the men played 42 and pitched horseshoes and the boys hunted arrowheads in the woods.

"On one of those Sundays, Cletus lost one of her white kid gloves.

"She was broken-hearted and sobbed to grandma about the loss. Grandma was a handsome woman for her age, not fussy and not particularly cultured, but with flashes of intelligence and passion; proud, strong-willed and unpredictable. She knew what Mona Lisa was smiling about.

"Why doesn't someone invent something to hold your gloves when you're not wearing them?" Cletus wailed.

"If they don't have a doo_dad, grandma said, 'why don't you figure something yourself? I'll buy one myself.'

"Cletus began thinking about what Grandmother had told her. Meanwhile Cletus' dad worked his way up to driller and they bought a six-room house in Seminol.

"Cletus got her dad to make the doodad. They got a patent for this simple accessory for women to snap onto their purses. It sold well.

"Cletus moved into a 12 room house in Oklahoma City. Her dad became superintendent in the Carter Oil Company.

"Then Cletus opened a factory in New York City. After she had made \$3 or \$4 million she decided to open a factory in California. She bought a 24 room house right next door to Dianah Shore's.

"A11," Hershcel B. King said, "because of a lost white kid glove."

A CURE FOR SCARLET FEVER.

(Taken from the Nov. 26, 1903 issue of the Goodland NEWS Kansas...sent by Mrs. Dupsky).

I have a valuable receipe, one I have tried in my own family, and know it to be a sure cure for scarlet fever. The following is the receipt: Sulphate of zinc, 1 grain; foxglove (digitalis), 1 grain; 1/2 teaspoonful of sugar mixed with 2 teaspoonfuls of water; when well mixed add 4 ounces of water; take a teaspoonful every hour, for a child a smaller dose according to age. Either small pox or scarlet fever will

disappear in 12 hours; it is also a preventative given every hour.

A Local Physician Says the Prescription Is No Good.

Last week this paper published by request the recipe of A.A. Shirley for cure of scarlet fever and small pox. A long time regular practitioner in this city says of the recipe: "There is nothing in it, as the dilution of the materials of the prescription, namely, one grain of sulphate of zinc and one grain of digitalis in four ounces of water, makes the dose only one thirty second part of a grain of the ingredients, and more than that, there is no germicide in the preparation."

He also said that htere was danger of the people being misled by the recipe, relying on it when a physician should be called; that five or six years ago a family used the Shirley prescription, finally calling in a physician when it was too late and the child died. Patients may die in any event, but to rely upon such and attenuated solution of these ingredients would have about the same effect as taking so much water.
