Shirley Faye Hill, Chairperson of the OBEDIAH SHIRLEY FOUNDATION, INC., and Betty Shirley will be coming to South Carolina March 2nd and staying thru March 7th. We want to meet as many Shirleys in the area as we can during our stay. The following is a letter to all those in the area of Honea Path and to those of you who live near enough that you would like to drive over on Sunday for a visit and be involved in this meeting.

What an exciting time to be a Honea Path area Shirley! The eyes of Shirleys from Canada, England, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand-- as well as the 50 U.S. states are focused on you right now! Never has the Shirley family been so united as it is behind the acquisition and restoration of the Obediah Shirley house.

Necessary legal paper work setting up the "OBEDIAH SHIRLEY FOUNDATION, INC" is nearing completetion so title to the home plus one acre of land should pass to the Shirleys real soon!!!

What a thrill for the Shirley family to actually own such an important and ancestral home; However, with ownership comes responsibility. Do the Shirleys shirk from responsibility? CERTAINLY NOT! Our ancestors did not and neither shall we. This project requires the support of us all. Let's begin to show

our sincere interest by attending a "Shirley Session" at the First Baptist Church of Honea Path at 2:00 PM on Sunday March 6th.

Three main Shirley branches have their roots in South Carolina, John and Eliz. Barmore Shirley, Benjamin and Eliz. Hughes Shirley, John & Eliz. Fields Shirley. We shall discuss their relationship to one another, as well as show a video of of the original seat of all Shirley lines-Ettington Park England, listed in the Domesday Book of 1086. The land has been in the Shirley family for over 900 years. What a rich heritage our ancestors passed to us. It's now our responsibility to preserve that heritage for future generations. What better way than to restore an ancestral home and establish our own Shirley Museum with items from all Shirley lines available for view.

Shirleys built the Obediah Shirley house orginally and Shirleys should lead in its restoration, so we are planning a work week the last week of May. We will need carpenters, plumbers, electricians, gardeners, etc...and yes, some good home cooking for our workers, plus plenty of hard cash!

Make your own personal committment to the Shirley project as we work together to perserve a bit of Shirley, as well as Anderson County history.

We apreciate the First Baptist Church at 100 South Main st. for letting us use their Social Hall for this Shirley Session. This church is most apropriate as the land was donated by the Shirleys. One of the stained glass windows in the church is dedicated to the Shirleys.

We know some are bringing recreation vehicles, and some will be staying in motels. The Honea Path First Baptist Church was interested in having the old Shirley Hotel registered with the National Trust. Unfortunately, it did not qualify as it had had some remodeling or changes in the past. We are sorry to hear of this. The land can be registered but not the building as I understand it.

If we can accomplish registering the Obediah house, you can see we have a unique house to be even more proud of.

The bases for allowing a house to be registered is no changes to the structure. It must be as was orginally built. We believe this is the way it is with Obediah house. It is orginial and no add ons or changes. It should be able to qualify. We will no doubt learn more of this when we meet with the people of the Historical group in S.C. JOHN SHIRLEY OF S.C.

[Taken from Sue Henderson book]

The first proven ancestor of our side of the family was JOHN SHIRLEY. Tradition is that he was a younger brother of Benjamin Shirley (who married Elizabeth Hughes), born around 1768 in Prince William County, Virginia. He may have been the son of Richard and Margaret Shirley, who were dismissed from the Broad Run Baptist Church June 12, 1774, Fauquier County, Virginia, to Culpepper County, Virginia. On June 22, 1785, they were among the charter members of the Old Turkey Creek Baptist Church in Abbeville, South Carolina. John and his wife, Elizabeth Fields, are also listed as members of the Turkey Baptist Church in Abbeville, South Carolina.

On June 23, 1832, Benjamin and Obediah Shirley applied for letter of aministration on the estate of John Shirley and on October 24, 1832, adm. adm. to Obediah Shirley. On October 4, 1832, Obediah was made guardian of Loranzo (Loving), Catherine, Arnis and Elizabeth Ann Shirley minor children of John Shirley, dec'd. Final settlement. Elizabeth Ann Shirley married prior to Feb. 2, 1832, Robert Chamblee. The wid. one third and seven distibutees.

JOHN SHIRLEY b. ca. 1776 probably Prince William County Virginia. Died Feb. 1832 Abbeville, South Carolina. Married Elizabeth Fields.

NOTE.... Family tradition has said that Richard Shirley (wife Margaret) was a brother of John Shirley (wife Elizabeth Barmore).

If John (w. Elizabeth Fields Shirley) and Benjamin (w Elizabeth Hughes Shirley) were brothers, and if Richard and John Shirley (who married Elizabeth Barmore) are brothers, then you can see the relationship to one another. These three branches...John and Eliz. Fields John and Eliz. Barmore and Benjamin and Eliz. Hughes...Brothers, uncle and nephews

The M.J. Shirley home on West Greer Street is now owned by the First Baptist Church. Members of the Historical Society presently are working to have the home listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

JOHN JASPER SHIRLEY, SON OF OBEDIAH

John Jasper was born July 18, 1825, at Little River, five miles from Honea Path, Anderson County S.C. While an infant his family moved to Honea Path, where he grew up and was long one of the most conspicuous figures in town. When the railroad reached Honea Path in 1853, he was chosen DepotAgent, a position he held for 28 years. Before the Civil war he built the SHIRLEY HOTEL and was its owner and manager for forty years.

He gave the land for the Honea Path First Baptist Church. He was a deacon in the church. He married Ann Elizabeth Mattison on December 20, 1855. They were the parents of three sons: William Augustus, Robert Milton and John Fetcher.

John Jasper Shirley died March 9, 1907, when in his eighty-third year. Though well advanced in years at the time of the Civil War, he served as a loyal soldier of the Confederacy in Company F of the twenty-first Regiment under Col. Keith, and as First Lieutenant had command of the company part of the time. Because of ill health he was sent home in 1863.

A stained glass window in the First Baptist church of Honea Path is dedicated to this family.

History



Honea Path associated with honey since Indians roamed the countryside

There is more irony than honey in this town's name, despite its long association with honey and the honey bee.

There is documented proof that the town originally was named "Honey Path." It is so named on the town's charter, and recorded on maps and land deeds for a dozen years after the charter was issued.

Just how the town lost its original name has at least two explanations

or suppositions.

Local historians point out that it was most likely through a hand-writing error that the "y" in Honey was changed to an "a." Early settlers lacked skills in reading and writing, and in 1854 when the town was chartered, land grants were written in Old English and penmanship was flamboyant. Often the letter "y" was mistaken for an "a" because the tail of the "y" was blotted out below the line, causing the top part of the "y" to resemble an "a"

Also, its been noted that it was common that in proper names the "y" was changed to an "a." It is worth noting that on an early map of South Carolina that lists the name and location of "Honey" Path, the Saluda River is listed as "Saludy" River.

Also, a copy of an original land grant dated 1788 reads as follows: "Given under the great feal (sic) of the State of South Carolina, to William Honey — situated in the District of Ninety Six on the East side of Broad Mouth Creek, Waters of Saludy river, bounding on the S.W. by Henry Boucher and S.E. by Richard Sadler on the other side of the vacant land."

It is entirely possible the town was named for William Honey, a land owner and trader who traveled to and from the Indian Reservation.

Honey's grant was discovered in 1776 by history buff Norman Hammett of Honea Path. He loaned it to the authors of "Honea Path Milestones," a book published to commemorate the Bicentenniel year. Copies of the early map and land grant, which can be seen in the public library, are included in this book.

A legend, which for years was told by schoolchildren, came from the late Dr. D.W. Daniel, dean of Clemson College. In it, he contends that the Indian word for path is "Honea" — implying that the Indians called the settlement "Path Path"

According to Daniel, in the vicity of Honea Path's present Main Street was a grove of trees, many of which were laden with honey. Indians traveling along a foot path between their village in the foothills to Long Cane, near Abbeville, would stop and 'rob' the bees and take honey back to their tents in the hill country." he wrote.

This story influenced the local high school to choose the honey bee as its mascot emblem and the "Stingers" as the nickname of the football and baskethall teams

football and basketball teams.

More recently, the Honea Path
Jaycees came up with the idea of
having a "Honey Sop" for their
annual money-raising project.
Whether it's Honey or Honea, the
venture has been a successful one
for the Jaycees.

Still shrouded in mystery is the reason citizens allowed the name to remain Honea when the charter clearly shows "Honey." Especially when most natives pronounce the town's name "Honey" Path anyway.

ROBERT MILTON SHIRLEY, SON OF JOHN JASPER SHIRLEY

ROBERT MILTON SHIRLEY born March 14, 1838, and died January 29, 1918 in the house where he was born in Honea Path, S.C. He attended public school and was not more ten years of age when his special genius for business prompted him to become a clerk in a local store. Thus, he had a thorough training in business when most boys are engaged in their books and school routine. In 1893, he started in business on a small scale as a general merchant. He gave up his mercantile business to organize the Bank of Honea Path. He became its president and served that institution faithfully and well for nearly a quarter of a century. Mr. Shirley had a character and the ability which made him implicitly trusted by all

who knew him. In every sense he was a leader in the community, taking part in organizing the Honea Path Mills and serving as its vice president. He owned extensive farming interests. He was active in the establishment of the Carnegie Library and was a member of the Knights of Pythias. He served as elder in the Presbyterian Church.

His son, great grandson of Obediah, was Malcolm John b. 1893 d. 1944. He married Nelia Simpson.

Nelia recently sold the old Shirley hotel to the First Baptist Church of Honea Path.

- Record Book 1666-72 I read every line, not just marginal entries, and found no Shirley entries.
- Record Book 1710-13 As Bayne had already read this book, I simply looked at the entry that she listed in her report. I would like to determine what relationship there was between the Shirley family and Rebecca Price. I have found several records of an Arjalon Price in the 1720's and 1730's, but have not yet decided whether the name Argeland came to the Shirley family from the Price family, or from the Shirley family to the Price family.
- Record Book 1706-20 I also reviewed the deed (p.151) from Jno Adams to John Shirley, and abstracted it as follows:
- p. 151 13 Feb. 1701/2 John Adams to John Shirley 60 acres, located on the left side of the main road from Cone mill toward Quintenoake. One of the corners of this land is "the place which is called the marked hickory by the R. L. Roade, thence along a line of marked trees that parts the land of <u>Richard Shirley</u> and this land."

On the following page, I found this deed:

p. 152 - 12 Mar. 1705/6 - William Grady of Stafford County to John Shirley of Northumberland - one moiety (half) of 100 acres located near the head of Coan River, said land first granted to Col. John Trussell and by him assigned to James Claughton, who assigned it to Robert Seck and John Coutanceau, who divided it. Coutanceau then sold his 50 acres to Henry Moseley, who sold it to Jos. Edmunds whose attorney sold it to John Oliver. Oliver died without heirs, and the land escheated and was bought by Robert Wilson who had married Oliver's widow. They sold the land to Walter Grady, whose heir was the said William Grady. Said land located on King's Creek.

Then, just to round things up, I include here the following:

These records allow us to zero in on the Shirley land (or at least to the general area. See enclosed map.



Also, I have recently indexed all the items that show family relationships in OB 1737-43 (with the exception of the presentation of wills or granting of administrations, which I assume are covered thoroughly in Lewis & Booker's Wills and Administrations). I have checked that index, and found one new Shirley entry (an unindexed one). See below

Results of above research:

Order Book 1678-99, p. 37-8, 7 June 1679 - List of tythables in Northumber-land County - includes Thomas Shirley /only Shirley listed/
This book is not mentioned in above list; I just noticed that you do not have this in the records you received from Bayne, so decided to include it.

Deeds, Orders, 1650-52 - I have recently abstracted this book, and the abstracts include every name mentioned. I read my abstracts and found no Shirley entries.



Order Book 1737-43 - p. 253 - Peter Bearcroft is appointed guardian to Joseph Shirly, orphan of John Shirly deceased. 12 Apr. 1742

Note: In the deed from John Adams to John Shirley there is a reference to the "R. L. Road." Present day Route 600 is called the Ridge Road because it follows the "ridge line" between the Potomac and Rappahannock Rivers. Therefore, it is probable that the R. L. Road meant the Ridge Line Road. The Quintonoake tract was a large one and was in the area now called Rainswood. Notice the church named Oakland. It is on the Quintonoake tract.

You can see Coan Mill Stream on the map. Notice, however, that the road from the mill joined the Ridge Road at two points. However, at this point, my guess would be that the Shirley land was located on the south side of present day Route 638. (See blue area marked on map.)

War of 1812 Muster roll....

John Shirley appears with the rank of Private on a Muster roll of a company of Mounted Militia of Missouri Territory, commanded by Captain Timothy Phelps, as mustered and discharged at James Ferry, on Missouri, this 8th day of August 1815. for...June 11, 1815 roll dated...James Ferry on Mo. Aug 8 1815. Commencement of service...June 11, 1815 Expiration...Aug. 8, 1815 Place of residence...Washington Co. Mo Distance from James' Ferry...75 miles sent by Gail Darling

Of record in Washington Co. Mo. as we have printed before was....

Thomas Shirley b. ca. 1760/61 South Carolina. He was a resident of Fairfield County South Carolina in 1780 when he entered the service. His father died before he was born.

His places of residence since the Revolutionary war was...Davidson Co. then Mc Nairy Co. Tenn. From there to Clinton Co, Fayette Co and Jackson Co. Ill. In 1850 he was a resident of Washington Co. Mo.

In Thomas Shirleys pension papers... he states his reasons for moving from Ill. to Mo. "He has some children in Missoure and he and his son (Jordan) with whom he lives desire to remove to Missouri.

In 1840 Washingto Co. Mo we find a Jonathon Shirley.

Jordan Shirley was b. 1804 Tenn.

My question is...does anyone know who this John is on the Muster rolls and how is related to Thomas? Son or a brother??? For him to be a son is of question unless he was one of many children and much older as the dates of service was 1815. His son Jordan was born in 1807. So comparing dates of his birth and possible dates of other children, could he be a son? If Thomas b. 1760 and was born after his father died, he would have no younger brother. If a brother he would have been at least 57 in 1815.

AUSTRALIA -- NEW ZEALAND TRIP


CANCELLED !!!
