Our Shirleys lived just over the Prince William line from Chapmans Mills. They belonged to the Broad Run Baptist Church in Chapmans Mill. The road from Haymarket over to Marshall is now Virginia state route #55. The road from Middleburg to White Plains is now Virginia Route #17. Fauquier and Alexander Pike on on U.S. Rout 29-24.

Benjamin 1762 and Elizabeth Hughes Shirley were the parents of Nathaniel Shirley who married Nancy Grubbs.

Nathaniel Shirley, Dr. James Latimer and his wife, Catherine Kay, Our link to President Jimmy Carter are buried in a private cemetary on the old Elmer Branyon farm on Rt. #89.

A log cabin built by Nathaniels brother, Mastin ca. 1820 still stands beside the cemetary.

Nathaniel Shirleys wife, Nancy, is in Little River Church Cemetary. President Jimmy Carters grandfather, Rev. James Kay, brother to our Catherine Kay, is also buried there.

## LETTER FROM STAUNTON HALL IN ENGLAND

It was a great pleasure showing David Bellamy around the Hall a few weeks ago to enable him to take a few photoraphs prior to his visit to California. I expect you will have seen the results by now and I trust you were impressed with the sympathetic way in which the repair and restoration work is being splendid family carried out. So homes such as Staunton Harold Hall are badly treated when being adapted for new uses. However I can assure that in this case the careful attention to detail and work in association with English Heritage has resulted in a truly first class job. It has created, as described by Lady Ryder, "a home for the living".

The present Earl Ferrers in addition to his appointment in the House of Lords, is Chairman of the Royal Commission of Historical Monuments, and as a Patron of our Appeal takes, as you can imagine a real interest in what is happening here.

Without wishing to repeat what David may have said to you I can say this project which is Group Captain Cheshire and Lady Ryder's first combined major venture in Britain, is seen by many as one of the most imaginative and comprehensive undertakings ever embarked upon, using a Grade 1 building, for such a range of uses associated with the relief of supporters both at home and overseas.

To achieve this we have to raise approx. 1,000,000 pounds whith the majority of this coming from the voluntary sector. You will see from the enclosed brochure which incidently was made possible by the generousity of a group of supporters, that one of the ways in which we tackle our fund raising is to encourage the formation of support groups. These work as an independent body, usually with their own committee, holding the money they raise in their own account and transfering sums from time to time to the main appeal account via this office.

I hope you do not think it too impertient of me to ask if you would be interested or able to form such a group. Obviously most of our groups are interested in the Hall as they live within a radius of twenty miles or so, although we do have some further afield than this.

I realise that this is very much a long shot but with your close association with the Shirley Family I thought you may like to be invited to help us. Apart from anything else it would give a tremendous boost to our local supporters, and people who will eventually benefit from the work here, to think that such interest was being shown by people so far away.

We produce a newletter about four times a year and whatever your decision I would be pleased to send you a copy if you would like to receive it.

I seem to recall that David mentioned that your Association was involved with helping with the restoration of other Shirley Homes so I will, of course, quite understand if you feel unable to help us. However, I will keep my fingers crossed for we still have a long way to go to reach our goal.

I REALLY WOULD LIKE TO HELP!

The following letter sent by Alabeth Wooding.

Summit Point, Jefferson Co. W.VA. January 10, 1912

Mr. R.B. Shirley: Dear Sir:

Your letter received. I am always glad to hear anything about the Shirley family. Wish I could give you full particulars about my ancestors, but my father died when I was a mere boy. Thinking then, more about my dog and gun, than family history. Such few facts, as have been impressed on me by some venerable relative, I will gladly tell you.

We read in history, in the reign of Edward the Confessor, the Shirleys bore the Christian name of Sewallus, which is still borne today by the Earl Ferrers, the head of the house. The Ferrers peerage came into the Shirley family throught the marriage of Sir Henry Shirley, of Chartley Park, to Lady Dorothy Derereus, [should be Devereux], Earl of Essex, who was likewise Lord Ferrers. On the death of Lord Essex, his barony of Ferrers, fell into abeyance, whence it was called by Charles 11 in favor of Sir Robert Shirley of Chartley Hall, grandson of the Lady Dorothy Devereux, mentioned above. Subsequently King Charles advanced him to the dignities of Viscount Tamworth and Earl Ferrers. The widow of the fourth Earl of Ferrers, married Lord Frederick Campbell brother of the Duke of Argefle. Now, while I am not related to the Campbell family, I remember, some of the old Campbell portraits used to hang in my fathers home. I have been told the first Shirley, who came to America, was Sir Walter Shirley, who came over with a hunting party and settled in the region of the James River. Now here my record is dim. As far as I know my grandfather, James Shirley, had the following children: JAMES, ROBERT, TIMOTHY, and MARY PATIENCE. Mary must have married a Mr. Howard, as my fathers niece Mary Howard lived with him.

Following the tide of migration ever westward, the three Shirley brothers journeyed from the tide water region to the Shenandoah Valley and settled near a little village named Smithfield, afterwards nicked named Wizard Cliff.

Timothy joined the army during the war of 1812. He afterwards migrated to Mo. Little

has been heard from him, as in those days, correspondence was a laborious and expensive task.

Robert, for whom I am named, moved to Kentucky. My father, named James, was born in 1768, he married twice. By his first wife, Ruth, he had two children, James and Mary. James married a Miss. Mary Grantham and their children were: WALTER, JOHN JAMES, RUTH and MARGARET, all dead but John who lives in Smithfield, now Middleway.

Mary Shirley married William Hurst, their children were: John, James, Ruth, Stephen and Elizabeth. John and his children still live in Jefferson County. My father's second wife was Matilda Vinson of Montgomery County Indiana. They had four children: ROBERT VINSON, GEORGE WILLIAM, THOMAS LEE and ELIZABETH. Thomas and Elizabeth are dead.

I was born in 1825, my brother a year and half later. He lived in Charletown W.VA. Although we are both well advanced in years, all our faculties are spared us, and we enjoy good health and happiness.

If you should ever happen in this part of the world, I would be glad to have you come to see me we will talk over all we know about the Shirleys. I understand the Earl Ferrers coat of arms, and history of the Shirley family from its origin in 1779, can be obtained from Martin and Allardyce, Cor. Frankford Ave. and Orthodop St., Frankford, Philadelphia, Pa.

#### REPORT ON WORK WEEK AT OBEDIAHS HOUSE!

Work week was a success! Much credit goes to two young Shirley men who came from California to work on this project. Dale and Nathan Shirley. You on the trip to England will remember these two young fellows. Dale is my son and Nathan is Barbaras (my niece who travels with me to so many of the meetings and conventions), son.

Large boulders were walked from the field across from Obediahs house by Dale and Nathan to help secure the foundation after getting it leveled. This was no small task! It was they who did most of the work in sheeting the two story building preparing it for new roofing. All of the workers agreed they were the key help in getting the more difficult work accomplished.

But, there were others who were very devoted to this project and worked very hard too! Nathans father, Lee, and Dales father and my husband, Guy. Guys sisters husband was very helpful and isn't even a member of the Shirley Association. He, James Massey, came with us not knowing what he could do to help. But he soon found areas he could work. His wife Mildred helped Dot Ricketts with the clean up and meal preparations since it was with the Ricketts our California gang stayed. Julian Ricketts was over at Obediahs working with the rest of the Shirleys. These lovely people stayed down the street at a relatives home at night so we could stay at their home. There were 8 of us from California. Barbara and I helped when we could and the rest of the time was spent selling raffle tickets in front of BI-Lo Grocery store in Honea Path to raise funds for this project. Also we did some cemetary hopping...even after dark!!!

Tom Shirley from Ft. Worth, Texas bought a new travel trailer and truck and made the trip to work on Obediahs house. He brought tools and was helpful in keeping things together for us. He is a fantastic person! He worked where he could doing what he could. He is a bit limited since having a heart attack last year. You did good Tom!

Another group who came from Texas was Pat and Leo Norman. Pat is a sister to Shirley Faye Hill who also came to work on Obediahs house. Leo and Pat have been members of the Shirley Association since Jan 1981. This was the first time I have really spent any time with them. They are very dedicated to the restoration of this house as this is Pats ancestors house. Leo is a very hard worker and we enjoyed their company.

Another person came the first morning to take some pictures of Obediahs before we leveled the house. His name? John Shirley and he is from Anderson, S.C. Several churches in the area provided food for the workers during work week. This gave us a chance to meet some of the local people as they stayed and served us and we had a time of fellowship with them.

Honea Path is a great little community. Visit sometime when you are in the area. Do stop and ask for directions to Obediahs house and see for yourself the success to date of the restoration efforts on this fine old Shirley home.

# BETTY SHIRLEY RESIGNS AS PRESIDENT OF OBEDIAH SHIRLEY HOUSE FOUNDATION, INC.

It is with much regret and sadness that I, Betty Shirley, must resign as President.

To me the Shirley Association has always been first and foremost and shall continue to be. I feel a responsibility to make decisions that would be best on behalf of the Association.

The board of Directors who also serve as the officers of the Foundation and myself have had some differences of opinions in reguards to this project. After <u>careful</u> consideration (including a 4 hour long distance call), I decided it would be in the best interest of the Shirley Assoc. and myself to let the Obediah Shirley family continue with the business of restoring their ancestors house.

In a registered letter of Aug. 20th, 1988, I found statements and recommendations which I did not feel comfortable with...considering this was to have been the site of the SHIRLEY ASSOC. NATIONAL SHIRLEY MUSEUM for ALL branches of the Shirley family.

The message contained in this letter was that the board <u>did</u> agree with my recommendations of expanding the Board of Directors. My recommendations of 5 male Shirleys representing 5 different Shirley branches of the Shirley family was being rejected. I had given their names and why I recommended them.

A new group of names was presented to me and I was <u>TOLD</u> these would be asked unless I could show <u>acceptable</u> reasons why they should not be added...and I had 14 days to reply.

My reasons why I could not agree are: With the new list of people, should they accept, would bring the number of Board members to 5 from the Obediah family and the other person is a Judge in the area and is a non-Shirley. In my opinion the concept of a National Shirley Museum for ALL branches should have a Board with representation from several branches. Otherwise it gives the image of being an Obediah Shirley family and community museum. This is how I see it and think the people currently recommended would be a great asset to the project. It will not serve as a NATIONAL SHIRLEY MUSEUM from my point of view at this time and under these circumstances.

As President, I have had no input about this project since the March 1988 trip to Honea Path. How can a President function when they are not informed and requests for information go unanswered?

When I was in Honea Path community, I learned that the idea of the Foundation was being promoted as a completely separate organization and had nothing to do with the Shirley Association. In the newspaper write-ups locally, the name of the Shirley Association was never mentioned. This bothered me as it was this body of people who actually saved this house from <a href="immediate">immediate</a> destruction! It was to the Shirley Assocthis property was being offered IF we would agree to restore it etc. and give the donors a tax write-off.

The tax exempt status has not yet been determined. The Shirley Association was to be used as the influential subject for the determining factor. I trust the Foundation can qualify on their own. Otherwise, the property will revert back to the donors. We certainly don't want to see this happen. In this case we may have to re-evaluate this situation.

I WOULD LIKE TO THANK OUR SHIRLEY ASSOC. MEMBERS AND THEIR FAMILIES FOR THEIR SUPPORT AND DONATIONS TO THIS PROJECT! INCLUDING THOSE WHO HAVE SENT IN RECIPES AND PURCHASED COOKBOOKS...THANK YOU!

If you gave your donation with the National project in mind and are very disappointed to the point you would like your donation refunded...you should write to the Foundation so stating this fact. On the other hand, you may feel you have helped to save an old Shirley house from destruction and will be content with this idea. I cannot tell you how to react. All I can say is that I am sorry this has not worked out as I had envisioned.

I shall continue to be supportive of this project as I would of any other Shirley project. I wish them success and we would like to have some updates on this house from time to time.

# Veteran Berkeley Educator Granville Shirley Dies MARTINGS BURG (W.VA) JOURNAL MAY 18, 1988 Granville Van Shirley

SHIRLEY, GRANVILLE VAN, prominent educator, churchman, farmer, Navy veteran and summer camp direc-tor, died Monday morning fol-lowing a lifelong residency in

Berkeley County.

Born April 12, 1910, he was the son of the late Van I. Shirley and Bessie Adams Shir-

He was a teacher and school principal in Berkeley County

for 47 years.

He began teaching at the age of 18 in 1928 in one-room schools, known as Rabbit's Den and McCubbin in the Back Creek Valley. He then taught at Bunker Hill Grade School.

In 1936, he became principal at Pikeside Grade School after

earning his degrees.

Following service in World War II in the U.S. Navy as **Educational Services Officer in** Educational Services Officer in Dutch Harbor, Alleutian Islands, Alaska, he returned to Pikeside School. He moved to John Street Grade School, Martinsburg in 1949. Later he became the first principal of Martinsburg South Junior High School. Continuing a pursuit of Educational Curriculum Excel-Educational Curriculum Excellence, he initiated the first Open School Concept at Valley View Elementary at Darkesville. He ended his educational career there.

Shirley was a member of wood United Methodist Inwood United Methodist Church, he served on the Board of Trustees. He was a youth Sunday school teacher for more than 30 years and layman and Sunday school su-

perintendent.

From 1941 through 1978, he was swimming and waterfront director at Camp Shaw-Mi-Del-Eca on the Greenbrier River, near White Sulphur Springs.

He was a scoutmaster for the Boy Scouts of America for several years in Inwood. He received his bachelor's

degree from Shepherd College and his masters degree from West Virginia University

He was past president of the Shepherd College Emeritus Club, past president of the Eastern Panhandle Heart Association and vice president of the Berkeley County Historical Association.

He was a member of the Tri-County Older Group Club, Berkeley County Education As-

# David Shirley, former head of UT chemistry branch, dies

Dr. David A. Shirley, head of the University of Tennessee's chemistry department in Knox-ville from 1962 until his retirement in 1979, died of cancer Thursday morning at UT Hospi-

Shirley, 69, was a Knoxville native. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from UT. He had been a member of the UT faculty for 26 years and was nationally recognized for research in organic chemistry.

Shirley earned his doctorate from Iowa State University in 1943, and was a research chemist for Du Pont. Before joining the UT faculty in 1953, he was a pro-fessor at Tulane University in New Orleans.

"The department moved tremendously under Dr. Shirley's leadership," said Dr. Gleb Mamantov, who succeeded Shirley as department head in 1979. "He was an outstanding administrator and an extremely good organic chemist who was nationally recognized in the field.

"Most importantly, he was quite a human being," Mamantov

During Shirley's tenure, the chemistry department grew from a relatively small unit to a department with more than 30 fulltime professors and thousands of dollars in research contracts, Mamantov said.

Shirley wrote two books and had more than 75 scientific articles published. He also was active locally and nationally in the

Shirley received a chancellor's Citation for Extraordinary Service to UT in 1979 and the Distinguished Service Award from the UT chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1983. A plaque honoring Shirley hangs in the new Hodges Library

Shirley was recognized by "Who's Who in America" and made this philosophical observation in the book:

"I view life as an opportunity for a creative and perhaps triumphant effort by an individual against the underlying matrix of tragedy into which we are all born. Among the most lasting of these efforts are our creations in the arts, in literature and in the sciences, but also important is our recognition that in the striving for our goals and in the lessening of our own pain, we should not add to the burden of others.'

After his retirement, Shirley contributed money to a fund bearing his name which supports work done by graduate students and young faculty members in the chemistry department.

The family will receive friends from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday at Mann's Heritage Chapel.
