Shirley House

THE WHITE HOUSE, VICKSBURG MISSISSIPPI

Known to Union troops simply as "the white house" the Shirley House was owned by a family of the name and is the only wartime structure still surviving in the park. Why the Confederates did not destroy it has always been a mystery. It served as headquarters for the 45th Illinois infantry, one of the Federal units deployed there. Bombproof shelters were constructed to protect troops against enemy artillery fire--a tactic used by both sides.

Mrs. Shirley and her 15 year old son Quincy were the only ones at home when the house was caught in the cross-fire. Mr. Shirley had gone to Clinton to bring his daughter home from school. Mrs. Shirley and two house servants sat in a chimney corner where they were somewhat protected while the war went on around them. After three days, Mrs. Shirley moved to a cave in the side of a hill in the Valley some distance behind the house and then to a Negro cabin that served as temporary shelter.

On January 1, 1851, James Shirley bought the house and grounds from Mr. Ben Johnson in Vicksburg Mississippi. James was a native of Goffstown, New Hampshire and is descended from James Shirley who came from Ireland to New Hampshire, (lineage given in the following article).

James graduated from Dartmouth College, read law at Albany New York and soon left for Augusta Georgia where he was in charge of an academy. He began his practice in Florence Alabama and persued it in Huntsville Alabama. He finally settled in Vicksburg Mississippi. The townes people referred to him as "Judge Shirley".

He married twice. His first wife was Harriet Walsworth and they had one son, **James Jay**. His second wife was Adeline Quincy of Boston Massachusetts and their children were: **Alice, Quincy and Frederick**.

During the seige at Vicksburg, Akuce stayed in Clinton with her sister-in-law and Qunicy remained with his parents at the Shirley house. No mention was made as to Frederick's whereabouts during this period.

James Shirley's character was unblemished, his loyalty to the Union uncompromising.

It was his plantation that the interview occurred between General Grant and General Pomberton which lead to the surrender of Vicksburg, July 4, 1863.

The entrenchments ran through his fron yard and his house was destroyed. General Grant gave him possession of the house of a Confederate.

After the surrender of Vicksburg a great many claimed to have been loyal and General Grant referred their cases to Mr. Shirley. He servived the siege but a few days, however his wife lived several years longer. Both are buried behind the house in Vicksburg National Military Park.

General Grant was the commander of more than 50,000 men in the Yankee Army whose sole object at the time was to wrest control of the Mississippi from the bays in Gray.

The key to strategy of both was Vicksburg. As long as that city of 5,000 (then) stayed in the hands of the Confederates, the CSA had a slim chance. Food and other supplies, plus military replacements could flow into the Confederacy from its Western third.

If Vicksburg changed hands all would be lost. The Yankees could use the fortress city to control the river and choke off supplies. On July 4, 1863, the day after Picketts charge at Gettysburg failed, Vicksburg fell.

It was a bloody six weeks from May to July. Union casualties totaled 10,000, consisting of 1500 dead, 7500 wounded and 1000 missing. Gray losses were 9000 of which 1400 died, 3800 wounded and 3800 missing.

Daniel Shirley, the first son of John and Hannah (Stevens) Shirley, was born about 1761 in Chester, Rockingham County New Hampshire. He moved to Chautauqua County New York in 1826 and died Sept 4, 1831 in Warren County Pennsylvania. He served in the Revolutionary War, enlisting in Londonderry New Hampshire. He was placed on the Pension Rolls June 15, 1819 and transferred from New York to Pennsylvania Mar 4, 1826.

It is assumed Daniel is the father of Moses Shirley b. ca. 1800. He was listed as a single man on the tax rolls in Warren Co. Pa. He married Sarah Cogswell about 1825 and they lived for a time in Chautauqua County New York. It is further assumed they had a son Benjamin F. Shirley b. 1827 who was born in New York state, about the same time Moses lived in New York. Benjamin named his first son Moses.

Benamin F. Shirley 1827 d. Apr 4, 1907. He married Hannah H. Shirley. They are both buried in Warren County Pennsylvania.

ABSTRACT OF THE WILL OF SIR JOHN SHURLEY KNIGHT, ISFIELD, SUSSEX ENGLAND

April 25, 1631

To be buried in Chancell in Isfield where my ancestors are buried.

To my nephew Robert Shurley, son and heir apparent of Sir George Shurley, Knight, Cheife Justice of the King's Bench in Ireland, goods and chattels in my manor house at Isfield. Refers to 12 musketts, corseletts etc. at Isfield in care of Robert Courthope. Refers to lease of years in lands of Somerville Aston, Gloucester, assigned to Thomas Pelham, Baronett, Robert Tracy, Knight, Anthony Stapley and my nephew Arthur Shurley to be sold to Sir William Somerville, Knight.

My nephews Arthur Shurley and Pelham Shurley sons of my said brother Sir George Shurley, and my other two nephews Thomas Shurley and Henry Shurley, two other sons of the said Sir George Shurley. My nephew Henry Carton Esq.

My five daughters now living and the daughter of my daughter Somerville now deceased. Refers to ward-shippe of the body and lands of William Somerville.

My grandchild son of and heir of Sir William Somerville, Knight deceased and Dame Cicely his wife.

Refers to advowson of the Parsonage of Steanning conveyed to Rt. Hon. George, Lord Goring, to be conveyed to my wife Dame Dorothe Shurley. My sister the Lady Garton. Sons and daughters of my sister Garton with exception of her son Henry.

To Mr. Attersall, minister of Isfield. To poor of Isfield.

Wife Dorothe to be sole and only executrix.

My kinsman and friends Lord Goring, Sir Thomas Pelham Baronett, Thomas Shurley of Preston the elder Esq., Anthony Stapley and Patcham Esq., and William Newton, the elder of Southover, Esq., to be overseers.

Witnesses: John Shurley, William Newton, John Panton, Roger Cobier, William Durrant.

Proved: May 30, 1631.

ABSTRACT WILL OF SIR GEORGE SHURLY, KNIGHT, CHIEF JUSTICE OF HIS MAJESTY'S COURT OF CHEIFE PLACE IN THE KINDOME OF IRELAND

FEBRUARY 8, 1646

My wife Mary, all and singular lands and tenements in England, house in Dublin called YONGE CASTLE.

Mentions goods and chattells in possession of Mr. John Wenden in the city of Chester.

After my wife's death to Arthur Shurly gent. my second son, and after his decease to my grandchildren, George Shirley my third son and his heirs.

Rest and remainder to wife, who is named sole executrix.

Witnesses: Mat. Doyle

Probate granted to Maria Shurly Dec 30, 1647

Admon. May 6, 1657 to Penelope Selwynne, executrix of Dame Shurly.

HEREFORD COUNTY SHIRLEYS

The Isfield Shurleys ancient family appear to have taken their name from the "Shurley" manor in the parish of Longen, near Presteign.

Richard Shurley, Clerk. Presented to rectory of "Penbrigge" in Hereford Co. in year Henry VIII (1509).

Thomas Shurley was appointed baliff of Netherwood, Hereford Co.

NOTE: Hugh Shirley, grandson of Ralph Shirley (d. 1466) and Margaret Staunton, lived in Stockton, Hereford Co.

YORK COUNTY ENGLAND SHIRLEYS

These Shirleys were originally from Shirley in Derby County. They settled here in Laughton around 1534 and appear to be merely yeoman.

Richard Shirle in his will dated Feb 4, 1613 says he is of Wickersley and is a yeoman.

Thomas Shirley m. Sarah Eyre in Laughton in 1616. Their son Thomas d. Aug 19, 1667. His gravestone WAS in the middle aisle of Wickersley church. (It is not there anymore). Their grandson, Thomas Wylde inherited most of the lands of Shirley and he died in 1756 at Wickersley.

DORSET COUNTY

Bagbee, Parish of Sturminster Newton, The Shirleys have long been seated here. (36th Henry VIII),

The descendants of William Shirley of Bagbee acquired a fairly considerable estate now possessed by Mr. Shirley, Esq.

No pedigree appears for this family in the visitation book.

William Shirley died Sept 14, 1545 possessed of Backbere" and of this family was no doubt, William Shirley of Oxford, minister who died Aug 31, 1658 buried at Shapwick.

There are no sepulchral inscriptions for Shirleys at Bagbee nor are they noticed in the registers before 1690.

In the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, Kent Co. is a will preserved of Thomas Shirley of Clements Inn, gent. proved 1564/5. He was of this family as he mentions a lease of lands he held in Dorset County, kept in Castle of Sturminster Newton. His children were: Thomas, William, Nicholas and Joan.

HORSINGTON, SOMERSET COUNTY ENGLAND

Thomas Shirley chr Jan 19, 1800 married Ann Hallett Feb 24, 1825 Horsington Parish. They left England June 15, 1841 in the ARAB and arrived in Wellington New Zealand with their seven children.

William Sharley and Ann Crouch, married in 1779, were the parents of Thomas. William was buried June 18, 1851.

Information given in the Horsington Census says William was born at Ringwood, Hampshire England. The Parish records of Ringwood read in the entry of 1772, "March ye 11th William of Thomas and Charity Sherly".
